- (c) Read the following passage carefully and answer the questions that follow

 It is important that pregnant women and those with poor immune systems become aware of the potential risks posed by cats. Many of us keep cats as house pets without realising the dangers they may be habouring. Cats are hosts to infectious toxoplasma gondii, a protozoa that causes disease,

toxoplasmosis, in mammals such as humans. The protozoa is crescent-shaped and common in nature, but in its infectious stage relies on cats as host bodies. Adult humans rarely show signs of significant disease if they become infected. However, if pregnant women become infected, the foetus can become infected by parasites and suffer serious congenital damage. In the worst cases, infants may lose their eye sight and acquire motor deficits. In people with HIV AIDS, toxoplasmosis can cause seizures and death. The symptoms of the disease are not evident in cats so there is no way of knowing if a particular cat is a risk.'
