#### **QUESTION ONE**

In the case *Prosecutor v Jean-Paul Akayesu*, Case No ICTR-96-4-T the Court found that: "[T]here is no doubt that considering their undeniable scale, their systematic nature and their atrociousness, the massacres were aimed at exterminating the group that was targeted. Many facts show that the intention of the perpetrators of these killings was to cause the complete disappearance of the Tutsi."

- a). Discuss the circumstances under which killing could amount to the crime of Genocide in international law. (10 Marks).
- b). Explain the circumstances under which murder could amount to crime against humanity in international law. (10 Marks).
- c). Discuss under which circumstances willful killing could amount to war crime in international law. (10 Marks).

Because of its dependence on state co-operation, it is impossible for the international Criminal Court to Achieve its aspirations. Critically discuss this statement.
